
# **Transition Words**

#### **Essential Questions**



- HOW DO TRANSITION WORDS ENHANCE WRITTEN COMMUNICATION?
- HOW CAN TRANSITION WORDS STRENGTHEN ORGANIZATION?

## **Learning Intention / Overview**

A student spends time brainstorming their writing topic and then writes a rough draft that has beautiful word choice, but, wait... There's no organization to tie the ideas together. This is what so many students and their writing falls prey to. The use of transition words can be difficult and frustrating, but remains a vital component for proficient and distinguished writers. This mini lesson provides modelling and practice for students to see how transitions enhance the flow of ideas and in conveying one's meaning. Without transitions, the links and connecting with writing are broken.

# **Teaching Instructions**

- 1. Teaching students to use transitions is vital to expressing one's ideas! Do not share with them the focus for today's mini lesson.
- 2. Instead, begin by sharing the paragraph (Sample 1) about Thanksgiving with students.
- 3. Ask students to reflect on the paragraph's strengths and weaknesses. If students are familiar with the Six Traits of Writing, this is a great opportunity to have them score each of the traits, identifying the strongest and weakest areas.
- 4. After discussion, tell students that "transitions" are needed to give this paragraph a defined order and logic to the events that are being discussed.
- 5. Ask students to refer to their transitions handout and find appropriate transitions to improve the paragraph's organization and fluency.
- 6. After completing this discussion, show students the revised Sample 1 paragraph that includes appropriate transitions.
- 7. Ask students to reflect on the benefits of adding in transitions.
- 8. Depending on the age level that this lesson is being used with, you may want to reflect on the appropriateness of the sample 1 revised paragraph's transitions. For an older group, allow them to see sample 1 revision 2.
- 9. Ask them to reflect on the differences in the first revision and the second. (Hopefully, they will notice that the second revision has much more sophisticated and "non cookie-cutter" transitions.
- 10. Emphasize that in writing, the best transitions occur naturally and are not just "picked" from a handout or list.
- 11. Give students the "Transitions" practice sheet to complete.






